In the middle of our Saskatchewan winter, Serena SK invites you to join us for a destination themed evening getaway!

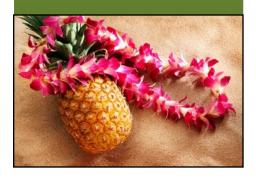
The fundraiser will include a catered banquet, silent auction, 50/50 draw, entertainment, wine toss, and photo booth.

The Health Ethics Guide

This guide was produced through the coordination of the Canadian Catholic Bishops and received input through a wide range of Canadian and internationally known professionals and experts in healthcare, ethics, and theology. We are told in the preamble that the Health Ethics Guide was designed for both personal and institutional use as follows:

For Catholics working in health and social service organizations that are not Catholic sponsored, the Health Ethics Guide provides valuable assistance. For people who work in Catholic health and social service organizations, regardless of whether they are members of the Catholic faith tradition, the Health Ethics Guide presents Catholic teaching and outlines the values that are to be respected by those who work within the organization. Finally the Health Ethics Guide can be used by persons receiving care, their families and anyone who seeks a framework to structure and articulate their own decision-making.

It is not a substitute for magisterial authority or as a substitute for the exercise of an informed conscience. That being said, it is an outline or guide of what one should be able to expect from Catholic Health and Social Service professionals and Catholic institutions. In the case of family planning information, the Guide also mentions the obligations of Catholic educators as well as health care professionals to be well informed in "natural methods" in order to help couples to exercise "responsible parenthood" by making "free and informed" decisions.

Of course, when health care professionals and educators are not informed about modern, scientific methods of Natural Family Planning, or give information that is heavily biased against these methods, truly informed decisions are difficult. This is to say nothing about the fact that many couples are truly lacking in instruction as to the reasons behind the moral unacceptability of contraception which either "temporarily or permanently" deliberately deprives the marital act of its procreative potential, thereby diminishing it's unitive capacity as well. In answer to this, the Guide makes reference to the "personalist norm" and the innate dignity of the human person as man or woman that is more fully explained in the teachings of the Church Fathers and most emphatically in the scriptural exegesis of Pope St. John Paul II entitled the Theology of the Body. In this regard, the Guide offers a very "bare bones" approach to the topic and further study and information on Catholic anthropology is vital to informing one's conscience on this issue.
